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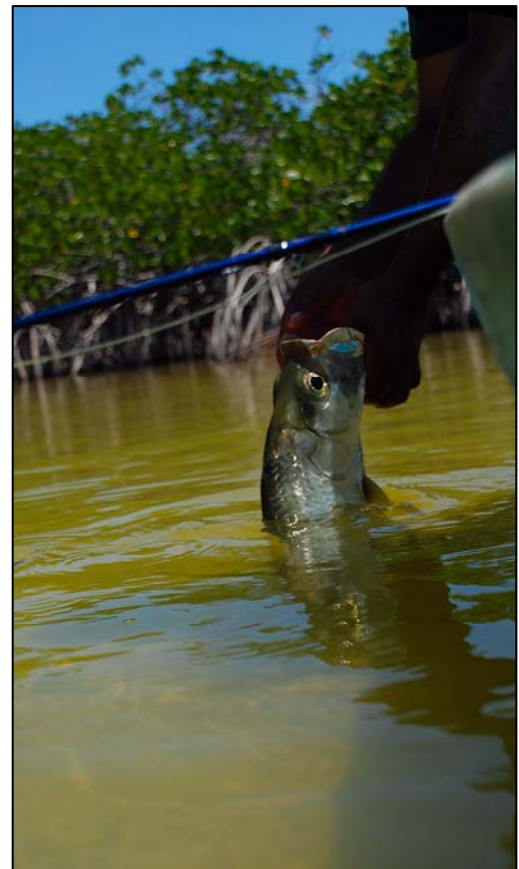
## Wilderness Flats Fishing in remote Coastal Mexico

**"Paradise Lodge"** is a comfortable saltwater fly fishing lodge situated on a beautiful Caribbean beach, in the southernmost part of the Mexican Yucatan Peninsula, just north of the Belizean border, offering anglers access to a remote saltwater wilderness in excess of 1 million acres.

Located in a most distant and out of the way part of Coastal Mexico, far from the mega resort metropolis of Cancun, Paradise Lodge is tailor-made for small groups of anglers in search of tarpon, snook, permit and bonefish. With the most diverse fishing program in the Caribbean, anglers at Paradise can select from four distinctly different fisheries that include a dozen or more inland tarpon and snook lagoons, the mysterious and still largely unexplored Espiritu Santo Bay, Chetumal Bay to the south for bones and permit and when it is calm, the ocean shallows in front of the lodge have produced big tarpon, large permit, jacks and larger than average bones. .

**The lodge**, nestled on a remote white sand beach overlooking the Caribbean and the second largest barrier reef in the world, was built with anglers in mind. Limited to eight anglers at one time, the eye-pleasing accommodations were designed to take full advantage of cool ocean breezes, with large picture windows facing the sea. Each double occupancy room is tastefully decorated and features its own private tiled bathroom. A separate, newly-built private cabana offers a perfect retreat for couples. Food at Paradise Lodge is in a class all its own and combines traditional local cuisine with delicious international influences. The open bar is always stocked with cold cervesas and the lodge makes the best margaritas on the peninsula.

**Non-fishing anglers** will enjoy the peaceful, tropical setting of the lodge site. Swimming, snorkeling, sea kayaking, Mayan Ruin tours, shopping excursions, and long walks on the beach are just a few of the non-angling activities offered at Paradise Lodge. Join us at Paradise Lodge for a unique and intimate saltwater wilderness fly fishing experience like few others on the planet.



## The Fishing Program at a Glance

Angling at Paradise Lodge is tailored around the angler's interests and the best available fishing, taking into account weather and water conditions. Fishermen may rise early in the morning and head off to one of the dozen inland lakes for juvenile tarpon and trophy snook. For those anglers wanting to fish Espiritu Santo Bay, a relatively good road has been completed and maintained and from Paradise Lodge to Bahia Espiritu Santo it's about a 2 hour drive... and well worth it.

**Fishing the Inland Lakes of Paradise:** There's no better location that we know of to catch tarpon on a fly rod than the inland lakes at Paradise Lodge.

Tarpon and snook fanatics can fish nearly a dozen inland lakes connected to the Caribbean by limestone caverns called "cenotes." These shallow lakes offer very reliable fishing for baby and medium size tarpon (5 to 40 pounds) and trophy snook (10 to 20 + pounds.) No matter what Mother Nature has in store, the lakes at Paradise are always a good angling option and offer protection from the wind.

**Espiritu Santo Bay:** Espiritu Santo Bay, below Ascension Bay, and to the north of Paradise Lodge is made up of an incredible collection of creeks, lagoons, back bays, channels and seemingly endless flats - it remains one of the most remote and un-fished saltwater fly fishing destinations in the world. The seasoned guides at Paradise have spent hundreds of hours exploring and fishing the bay. Espiritu Santo offers very consistent fly fishing for tarpon, snook, permit and bonefish. Espiritu Santo Bay is an exciting, razor-edge fishery that we highly recommend anglers take advantage of at least once during their stay.

**Chetumal Bay:** Chetumal Bay is located south of the Lodge and shares its water with both Mexico and Belize with the border cutting through the bay. Until very recently, there wasn't a whole lot known about fly fishing it. Paradise Lodge guides know Chetumal Bay and the fishing for permit and bonefish is getting better and better each year as the guides fish it more and more each season. Most of the most effective fishing is by boat, but there are numerous wadable flats to get out and stretch your legs and stalk feeding fish.

**Ocean side Flats:** This is the sleeper fishery of Paradise Lodge, right outside the front door of the lodge. If the conditions are right, light wind, calm water with little ground swell, we can launch a flats skiff right off the lodge beach and chase tarpon, permit and jacks all day long, inside the protection of the barrier reef. Occasionally we will see some bonefish, but not very often. Last season we took two grand slams off the beach – WALKING the water edge!



## Inland Lakes of Paradise

Paradise Lodge's location on the Yucatan Coast is unique, affording access to 4 distinctly different fisheries:

- 1.) Inland Tarpon & Snook Lakes
- 2.) Espiritu Santo Bay
- 3.) Chetumal Bay
- 4.) Ocean side Flats.

Few, if any, flats fishing lodges in the world have more to offer the skinny water fishing enthusiasts than Paradise Lodge. What is most unique about Paradise Lodge and what separates it from other saltwater fly fishing lodges is the inland tarpon and snook lakes. It's these dozen or so ancient lakes, connected to the Caribbean by limestone caverns called "cenotes" , that has drawn tarpon and snook fanatics to this part of the world for the past 15 years.

In our opinion, these shallow lakes offer the most reliable fishing for juvenile size tarpon (5 to 40 pounds) and trophy snook (10 to 20 + pounds) that we know of in the world.

The brackish-water inland lakes that you'll have all to yourself are anywhere from a 15-minute to 1 ½ -hour plus drive from the lodge. The lakes range in size from 100 acres to the largest, Mosquitero Lake, that is close to a thousand acres in size. Some of the lakes have permanent flat-bottomed boats stashed on them, while others you will trailer a boat to. Trails have been painstakingly cut through the jungle to the lakes. With names like Bugle Boy, Murky, Airport, Cenote and Blood, these mangrove-lined lakes are separated from the Caribbean by only a few hundred yards of sand and jungle. The lake's umbilical connection to the rich warm waters of the Caribbean are through cenotes, large underground caverns carved through limestone. Tarpon, snook, barracuda, snappers and jacks enter the lakes through these passages. The lakes act as a sanctuary and nursery for tarpon and snook, offering both cover and a rich source of food. Water in the lakes is replenished daily by tidal movement from the ocean, through the cenotes. Cenote openings in the lakes vary in size from 5 feet in diameter to a hundred feet or larger. Where the cenotes open in the lakes it's very common to see rolling tarpon.

Fishing on the lakes is normally carried out from a boat that is poled along the mangrove perimeter. Tarpon and snook are spotted lurking on the edges of the mangroves and cast to. However, it is not uncommon to see single fish out in open water looking for schools of baitfish to harass. These open water tarpon are usually larger (20 - 40 plus pounds) than those fish seen on the edges (5 - 20 pounds). The water in the lakes (for the better part of the year) is clear and ranges in depth from four to eight feet. In most cases you will be sight-fishing and guides call out fish in a standard manner using an analog clock face as a locator, "Tarpon at 1 o'clock forty feet moving left to right!" However, during the wet season (September, October) run-off water draining from the mangrove wetlands that surround the lakes takes on a stain. If we get more than three days of solid rain, the lakes can take on a red tint; created by water draining from the mangrove wetlands. Blind-casting to likely looking ambush points along the mangroves is the most effective method of fishing during these few months.

A day on the lakes is a lot of fun and typically sees each angler jumping a dozen or better fish a day, with a normal landing rate of about half that number. Tarpon are famous for coming unbuttoned once hooked. They spend as much time in the air as they do in the water. In an average week, most anglers will spend at least two or more days on the lakes chasing tarpon and snook.

Paradise Lodge is now fishing "new" lakes they discovered during the last decade of fishing and exploring. The lagoons are the "go to" spots when the weather gets tough. The most improved fishing in the lakes is the snook fishing and it continues to improve.

## Espiritu Santo Bay

At present the drive to Espiritu Santo Bay takes approximately 2 hours. It is an approximate 30-mile drive from Paradise Lodge to the launch site. Once the boat is in the water fishing can be from 15 minutes away. Having a quick boat is key to both bay programs and The Hells Bay Boats, powered by 50 hp 4-stroke Honda outboards will top out at approximately 35 knots...plenty fast.

Espiritu Santo Bay is made up of myriad creeks, lagoons, back bays, channels and seemingly endless flats. It remains one of the most remote and unfished saltwater flyfishing destinations in the Caribbean. There are only two lodges that have permits to sport fish there. Paradise is one of them. Over the last 6 years lodge guides have spent hundreds of hours exploring and fishing the bay. Espiritu Santo offers very consistent fly fishing for tarpon, snook, permit and bonefish. Our own personal experience in the bay resulted in, hands-down, some of the finest flats fishing we have ever had. The tarpon and snook we encountered in the bay readily took surface flies, and the permit and bonefish offered consistent action.

Espiritu Santo Bay is what we like to call an "Opportunistic Fishery"; that is, a fishery where you never really know when, where and what you are going to encounter. It's not uncommon to see several different species of fish, sometimes all at the same time on one flat. Trying to decide what rod you are going to have in hand is a real challenge. Having multiple rods in the boat, each rigged with a different fly, is the most advantageous way to fish the Espiritu Santo.

One of the nicest aspects of fishing Espiritu Santo is that you will, more than likely, be the only angler on the Bay. Paradise literally has the bay to itself, with little or no competition. Anglers are not locked into fishing the entire week on the Bay and are encouraged to take advantage of the other angling options at Paradise Lodge.



## Chetumal Bay

Chetumal Bay – It shares its shoreline with Belize on the south and Mexico on the west and north. It is about a 1 1/2 hour drive south and west from the lodge to the wind-protected boat launch. Both Espiritu Santo and Chetumal are a little bit of a drive, but you are traveling the miles in a comfortable vehicles instead of pounding waves in a boat. If these places and the lodge were easy to get to, they would not be the secluded, wilderness experience they are today. Chetumal Bay is famous for its large schools of bonefish and relatively few anglers. It is mostly boat fishing, but there are plenty of hard bottom flats to wade if you want to get out of the boat and fish. Chetumal Bay is huge with most of the fishing on the east side of the bay. During the spring and summer, permit schools are seen roaming the flats and a typical day will offer lots of shots at them. There are always permit around to chase - sometimes in surprisingly large quantities. Multiple shots are the norm. We have had days when you have permit in sight all day.

## Oceanside Flats of Paradise

Paradise Lodge has been consistently seeing and catching tarpon and permit from the Oceanside flats, behind the barrier reef, out in front of the lodge – right outside your window. Many tarpon in the 60-pound range are seen, jumped and a few landed. Usually the smallest tarpon you will see on these ocean side flats will be in the 20-pound category. Plenty of jacks live here too, some in the 20-pound range, and offer a lot of action. Permit are common and are usually larger than the bay permit we pursue and catch. We have had days when you have permit in sight all day.

There are a few bonefish on these flats and usually larger than those we find in Chetumal Bay. Last season we took two grand slams (tarpon, bonefish and permit) off the beach – WALKING the water’s edge.

Anglers are welcome to fish the ocean side flats (from the beach) after their guided day on the water, before dinner, if they choose. In order to safely fish the ocean side flats, the water needs to be very calm with minimum ground swells. This allows anglers to stand on the casting platform of the boat without being thrown. If the conditions are right, give this fishery a try, it is a real sleeper.





## Lodging

The new lodge building is completely rebuilt with all new furnishings. Alex de Tomaso is very proud of what he and his crew have accomplished in bringing back Paradise Lodge better than it has ever been before.



The main structure is a two-storey stucco building facing east and placed a short distance from the shore. One can observe tropical sunrises from its picture windows looking out across the sandy beach, past the reef and over the Caribbean Sea. Mornings don't start much better than this. The main floor of the building is the great-room with dining area, bar and lounging area with comfortable couches and chairs. Behind a wall at the back of this room is the chef's domain, where delicious meals are planned and prepared. The kitchen facilities were recently rebuilt with all new and modern culinary appliances and necessities.

There are three separate guest rooms directly upstairs of the great-room. Each room is furnished with double beds, air conditioned and has an overhead fan for those nights when the breeze through the windows from the ocean is just right without A/C. Every room has a coffee maker for those early risers who need that jolt of caffeine first thing in the AM and a refrigerator filled with drinks, water and snacks. Guest rooms are comfortable with plenty of room for storage and all have private bathrooms with a shower, hot and cold water. Rooms are cleaned daily (Sorry, there is no laundry service available at this time).

There is a detached cabana (called the "Casita") that is a little more private than the main rooms and is perfect for couples. It is furnished similar to the other rooms. It is available to all guests on a first request basis.

All of the water is purified and bottled purified water is used for drinking water. The electricity is supplied by generators and outlets are the same as in the US. It operates through the night to ensure a comfortable sleeping environment and only turned off for a brief period during the day while guests are fishing.

Paradise has an open bar and all drinks are on the house. It is amply supplied with local Mexican beer, tequila, vodka, gin and rum for cocktails. Delicious wines are served with dinner, also included in the package price.

A computer is available for guest use to check/send emails, weather etc. There is a phone at the lodge for customer use. There is a small fee for this service.

Pesos and US Dollars are gladly accepted methods of payment for gratuities and incidentals at the lodge. Credit cards and checks cannot be accepted.

## Guides at Paradise Lodge

**“Nacho” Lopez Luna** has been working and guiding at Paradise Lodge for more than 10 years. Over those years Nacho has developed into a very talented guide with a positive attitude and his ever present smile makes him a favorite among returning guests. Although Nacho can literally fish any of the water Paradise Lodge accesses, his specialty is fishing and exploring the tarpon lagoons and cenotes along the Caribbean Coastline. This is where Nacho really shines and where his decade of experience comes into play. I don't think anyone, anywhere; knows the lagoons like Nacho.



**“Victor” Herrera** is the brother of Nacho and is from the village of Limones., Victor is very familiar with the tarpon lagoons and is learning the bays under the watchful eyes of his brother. He is a very good fly caster and knows how to position a boat correctly for fly anglers. His English is good and his eyesight is excellent is excellent for spotting cruising fish. He is always in a good mood and provides a very pleasant day on the water.



**“Arturo” Herrea Pazos** is from Chetumal City, the capital of Quintana Roo. He is a man of many words. Arturo speaks excellent English and has a great sense of humor. He specializes in fishing the lakes of Paradise Lodge for tarpon and snook. He is no stranger to the bays, either, and will show you a good time while he is poling the flats of Espiritu Santo or Chetumal Bay looking for bones and permit. You will definitely enjoy the day out on the water with Arturo.



**“Jesus” “Chu-Cho” Martinez** is 24 years old and from the Mexican State of Veracruz. He started commercial fishing with his father at the age of six. Before coming to Paradise Lodge he sportfish guided at Casa Blanca and Costa de Cocos. Jesus is a dedicated and driven guide, with the eyes and fishing instincts of an osprey. Last year, in just three months, he had 27 permit to hand. Jesus has a calm demeanor, is confident and possesses an unfaltering enthusiasm to find his guests fish. 2011 will be his second full season at Paradise Lodge



**“Alejandro” Martinez** is Jesus' younger brother and is 22 years old. He guided with Jesus at Costa de Coco and is an experienced fishing guide, that understands the intricacies of fly fishing. Alejandro is excellent at hunting fish in shallow water and like his brother, driven in his pursuit of fish. Next year will be Alejandro's second year guided at Paradise.



## Fishing Seasons

**When is the best time to fish Paradise? As the old saying goes: “Anytime you can.”**

There are many reasons to choose one time frame over another. Considerations include; vacation schedules, winter relief from cold northern climates, business commitments, best fishing times etc. No matter when you choose to go to Paradise Lodge, the weather, more than any other factor will influence your success in shallow water and flats fishing. Ideally, 90 – 100% of the fishing at Paradise is sight fishing. Weather or water conditions may necessitate blind casting, especially in the lakes. This method, while not necessarily the favorite, is very productive in the lakes covering the waters at the edge of the mangroves. They hide out back in the roots and a well placed fly could coax them out of hiding at times. Clouds and rain, more than the wind, make it near impossible to see fish on the flats. Guides have tremendous eyesight and can see fish in seemingly impossible conditions. When sight fishing is difficult, listen to your guide. You may not see the fish but he does. Follow his directions for casting and retrieving the fly.

### Spring (March, April and May)

One of the safest and most productive times at Paradise especially as it reaches towards April and May. The cold fronts have all but disappeared and if they do show up, they are short lived and may not affect the fishing that much. The warm south-east trade winds are the norm with sunny, clear-sky days. Perfect for sight fishing. All of the flats fishes are fat and sassy by now. The lakes should be clear with excellent fishing for snook and tarpon. There could even be some migratory tarpon moving into the bays and along the Oceanside between the shore and the reef. The permit are happy in the bays and are available in schools, singles and doubles.



There will be windy days. In fact, plan on all days being windy. If this is your first time to the flats, you would be doing a great service to yourself to take a casting lesson from an instructor who has saltwater experience. The wind affects casting differently on the flats than it does while fishing trout on a river. If you don't know the double haul, this would be a good excuse to learn it. You certainly don't have to know how to cast the length of a football field to catch fish on the flats, but having some control over your cast when the wind is blowing 20 – 30 mph or more will improve your hookup rate.

Since spring is probably the best all around time to visit Paradise, it is also the most popular time at the lodge. So, early reservations are always wise if this is the season you want to fish.

**Twitch:** Just imagine watching the “Gurgler” (top-water fly) you've cast to the mangroves edge and let settle for a few seconds. Anticipation builds and when you give it a twitch – here he comes – fast and straight. The tarpon explodes on it and in your excitement and panic you have yanked it away. Patience...let it sit now. Twitch. Twitch. Twi...EXPLOSION! Strip Set and lean hard on the butt section of your fly rod, now you got him. Clear the line and bow to his jumps, keep a tight line, now you have him under control, now you have landed your first tarpon!

**Summer (June and August)** The best fishing of all year, but it is more difficult making the personal argument to go to Mexico during the summertime. The bonefish and permit are roaming the flats with far fewer anglers casting to them so they tend to be less spooky during this time. The lakes are clear and the tarpon and snook are at their peak.

The trade winds are really settling down now and while still windy, it isn't as volatile as during the spring. There can be some summer storms with violent winds, rain and clouds, but unless the storm has a name attached to it (hurricane), it usually lasts only a short time; even just a few hours. Remember- it is impossible to out guess the weather, but history can tell us when the odds are with us. Hurricane season begins June 1 and continues through November. The odds are that anglers fishing from Paradise are NOT going to be threatened by a hurricane, but it IS possible. You have to decide if this falls within your comfort zone - being in hurricane country during the season to enjoy some of the best fishing of the year.



**Fall (September, October and November)** This can be the most pleasant time of the year to fish. The weather is usually very comfortable, especially in the first 6 to 8 weeks of this season. Some time in the later part of it, mid to late October, the weather will start to change and cool off some. The lakes and the bays are a joy to fish. There have been relatively few anglers on the waters and the fish are not feeling threatened. The weather is the real key to this season. The fish are willing and if the weather is good, the fishing is good. That's the nuts and bolts of it. If you have the opportunity to fish Paradise during this time the fish are ready – are you?



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## Non-Fishing Activities

**World-Class Snorkeling:** About 150 yards from the white sand beach in front of Paradise Lodge, the second largest barrier reef in the world juts out of the Caribbean. There are literally thousands of acres of snorkeling within a rifle shot of the lodge. Anglers often conclude a day of fishing snorkeling the reef or swimming.

**The Land of the Mayans:** The Yucatan Peninsula, the location of Paradise Lodge, is the ancient home of the Mayans, perhaps the most fascinating of all Meso-American cultures. The original Mayans emigrated from Belize during the eighth and ninth centuries, considered the Classic Period of Mayan civilization. On the drive south from Cancun, your entry point to Mexico, you will pass close to a few of the many Mayan archaeological sites in the area, with names like Coba, Xel-ha, Tanchah, and Tulum. At the zenith of the Mayan Empire, between the sixth and eighth centuries, there were separate dynasties stretching from Yucatan to El Salvador and Honduras. Populations of Mayans during this time have been estimated as high as 15 million. Today Quintana Roo is home to some of the last remnants of Mayan culture. Many locals still speak a dialect very similar to that spoken before the Spanish Conquest in the 16th century.

**Living History:** The Mayan people thrive today throughout the Yucatan. You'll observe the modern-day Mayans and their homes and villages as you travel to and around Paradise Lodge.



**Sian Ka'an Biosphere... A Natural Paradise:** Paradise Lodge lies at the Southern edge of the vast Sian Ka'an Biosphere Reserve, established in 1986 as a Mexican National Park. In fact, several of the lakes you'll fish lie within the 1.3 million acre rain forest preserve.

The "birthplace of the sky" is home to some 103 mammal species, including jaguars, tapirs and ocelots. Its 339 bird species include toucans, ibis and roseate spoonbills. We can't guarantee you'll see these particular animals or birds during your stay, but you'll most certainly spot many you'll never see back home!



## Travel to Paradise

**Air travel to Cancun:** Please arrange to arrive in Cancun no later than 2:00 p.m. on your arrival day. Upon arriving at the Cancun airport, you will be processed by Immigrations. Make sure you receive a copy of your Mexican Tourist Card. You will then claim your baggage. Next you will clear customs. Once you clear Customs, make your way through the arrival area to the covered porch area outside the airport building. Transfer agents are not allowed into the arrival section of the airport. The transfer agent will be in this area holding a sign with your name written on it. If for some reason, the transfer agent is not there, be patient, they may have been delayed a few minutes due to traffic.

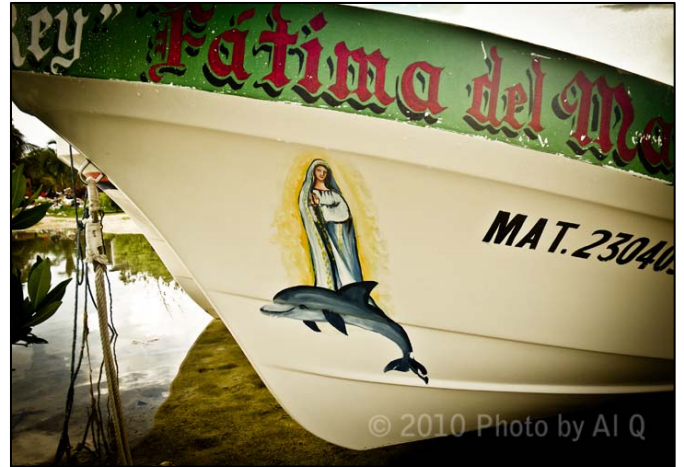
If you can't arrive in Cancun by 2:00 p.m. it's best to fly a day earlier, staying at one of the many hotels in the area, we can help you with recommendations. If you are going to be picked-up at a hotel, your pick up time will vary according to arrival of the other guests.

**The drive to the Lodge:** You'll ride in a comfortable vehicle during the 240-mile drive from Cancun to Paradise Lodge. It's about a 4 1/2 hour drive and extremely interesting, driving through Mayan country. You'll pass many Mayan archaeological sites along the road South of Cancun. Modern day Mayans are everywhere; you'll recognize them by their distinct features and get a glimpse of their dwellings and lifestyles. The last stretch of the journey is through a coastal jungle area, home to jaguars, ocelots and beautiful tropical birds, reminiscent of Florida's Everglades.

You will know you have reached Paradise Lodge when you see a cozy beachfront villa looking out over the ocean. The atmosphere at Paradise Lodge is very relaxed and the staff is willing to do whatever it takes to meet or exceed your trip expectations. A staff member will carry your luggage to your room, so you may relax and enjoy a cold one. After dinner, the day you arrive, there will be a brief orientation.

**Returning to Cancun:** Anglers are asked to schedule their airline flights back home to depart Cancun no earlier than 1:00 pm, leaving the lodge early in the morning. If you choose to spend some extra time in the Cancun area, you'll be delivered to your hotel.

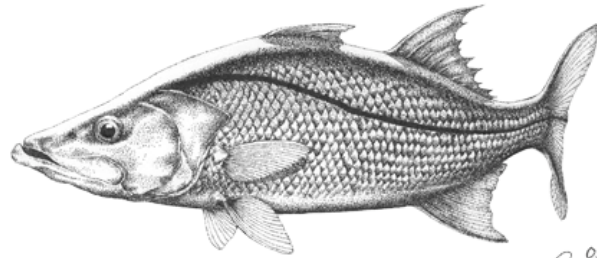

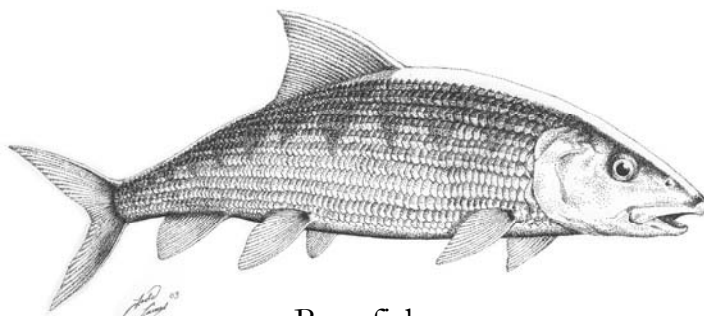
